## **MEMORANDUM**

Section 2-612, City of Miami Code, Transacting business with city, etc.

Thank you for contacting the Miami-Dade Commission on Ethics and Public Trust ("Ethics Commission") and requesting our guidance regarding your ability to participate in a housing assistance program administered by the City of Miami Department of Housing and Community Development.

## **Facts**

You are employed with the City of Miami as an Automotive Equipment Operator II for the City of Miami Department of Resilience and Public Works ("RPW"). Your primary job responsibilities include the operation of heavy automotive and maintenance equipment, such as backhoes, forklifts, vacuum trucks, and water pumps.

You are seeking to participate in the First-Time Homebuyer Program ("the Program")<sup>1</sup> administered by the City of Miami Department of Housing and Community Development. You indicated that your RPW job duties do not include any oversight or administration of the Program. You further indicated that you do not have any immediate family members working for the City who administer or oversee the Program.

#### Issue

Whether the Miami-Dade County Conflict of Interest and Code of Ethics Ordinance ("County Ethics Code") or the City of Miami Code would prevent you from contracting with the City of Miami Department of Housing and Community Development to participate in the Program.

# Discussion and Opinion

Generally, sections 2-11.1 (c) and (d) of the County Ethics Code permit municipal<sup>2</sup> employees to transact business with their employing municipality, so long as the contract does not interfere with the full and faithful discharge of the municipal employee's duties, the municipal employee does not participate in negotiating or awarding the contract, and the municipal employee's job duties will not require him or her to be involved with enforcing or overseeing the contract. See RQO 23-01. However, a municipal employee may not transact business with the municipal department for which he or she works. See County Ethics Code § 2-11.1(c)(2). Nevertheless, municipal employees and their immediate family members who are otherwise eligible for housing assistance administered by their employing municipality are permitted to seek such assistance, so long as the municipal employee does not administer the program. See County Ethics Code §§ 2-11.1(c)(5)(5), (c)(5)(7).

Similarly, section 2-612(a) of the City of Miami Code prohibits all City employees from "enter[ing] into any contract or transact[ing] any business with the city or any person or agency acting for the city . . . ." However, the City of Miami Code explicitly exempts from this broad prohibition against contracting with the City any City employee seeking to participate in an affordable housing assistance program, provided that the City employee "meets all criteria of the program and provided that the city manager approves the participation of the employee and that the employee is identified as being an employee of the city in applicable documents." City of Miami Code § 2-612(a).

In practice, an immediate family member of a City of Miami employee may participate in the then-extant First Time Homebuyer's Down Payment Assistance Program administered by the City of Miami Department of Community Development without giving rise to a prohibited conflict of interest so long as the City of Miami employee does not participate in the administration of the loan. *See* RQO 09-44. Similarly, a Special Aide to a City of Miami Commissioner may participate in the City's First-Time Homebuyer Program administered by the City's Department of Housing and Community Development without

giving rise to a prohibited conflict of interest because her job duties do not require her to be involved in any way with the administration or enforcement of the program. *See* INQ 22-51; *see also* INQ 25-04 (finding that you may participate in the District 5 Expanded First-Time Homebuyer Program because your job duties do not involve administration of the program).

Here, after reviewing the facts presented to us, we conclude that **you may contract with the City of Miami Department of Housing and Community Development to participate in the Program**, provided that you otherwise qualify to participate in the Program, the City Manager approves your participation in the Program, and your employment status with the City is disclosed on all relevant documents. *See* RQO 09-44; INQ 23-84; INQ 22-51. Because your employment as an Automotive Equipment Operator II with RPW does not involve any administration or oversight of the Program, and you will never have occasion to review, approve, or administer Program applications, your employment with RPW does not give rise to a prohibited conflict of interest. *See* County Ethics Code § 2-11.1(c)(5)(5); City of Miami Code § 2-612(a). Therefore, provided that your current or future job responsibilities with RPW or any other City of Miami department that may employ you in the future do not require your involvement in any aspect of the Program, you may apply to contract with the City of Miami Department of Housing and Community Development to participate in the Program. *See* RQO 09-44; INO 23-84; INO 22-51.

Additionally, you may not lobby the City of Miami in support of your participation in the Program. This means that you may not contact anyone within the City in an attempt to influence a decision about your participation in the Program. *See* County Ethics Code § 2-11.1(m)(1).

Furthermore, the County Ethics Code prohibits municipal employees from exploiting their official position. This means that you may not use your City position to secure special privileges or exemptions with respect to your participation in the Program or any other housing-related program administered by the City of Miami Department of Housing and Community Development. *See* County Ethics Code § 2-11.1(g); *see also* City of Miami Code § 18-108 ("Any attempt by city employees to realize personal gain by conduct inconsistent with proper discharge of their duties is a breach of public trust.").

This opinion is limited to the facts as you presented them to the Ethics Commission and is limited to an interpretation of the County Ethics Code and the City of Miami Code only. Based on directives from the municipal department that employs you, or under state law, other conflicts may apply. If you have additional questions regarding possible conflicts based on City of Miami directives, contact your supervisor or the Office of the City Attorney for the City of Miami.
